Who are we?

We are a team of scientists, health care professionals, and research analysts who develop and run clinical studies on addiction and mental health in the departments of Clinical Research and Clinical Neuroscience, at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH).

What is the study about?

The study is officially called **Probing Acute Opioid Effects in Bipolar Disorder**.

This is a clinical study that is investigating the effects of a medication on people with bipolar disorder who are currently depressed or currently euthymic (normal mood state), compared to those without bipolar disorder. We are also interested in studying the relationship between some drug effects and levels of the drug in the blood. The study drug is a

prescription painkiller. **This is not a treatment study.**

What does the study involve?

The study involves two days. On the first day you will take the study medication (either placebo or active drug- you won't know which). After this you will be asked to answer a number of questions about how you feel and complete computer tests that test your hand-eye coordination. Blood samples will also be taken. The second study day is exactly the same as the first day, but this time you will receive the study medication (placebo or active drug) that you did not receive on the first day.

How long is the study?

The study involves two study days that are scheduled one day

after another at a time that is convenient for you.

What happens after the study?

After the study your care will continue as usual and further treatment decisions will be made by you and your treatment team.

Am I eligible for the study?
